April Upholstery Seminar

This time we met at Steve Estep's garage or at this time Steve's Upholstery Shop. We had 18 members, 3 guests, and 10 cars, a great showing from the club. Steve started talking about what he did to his 50 Ford front and rear seats including carpet, which he did a great job on. This was his first complete upholstery job he had done, he started talking about the material. The time it took to decide what he wanted, and the price he wanted. He explained the price varies from one type to another. Then he talked about how he learned to make it all work. He talked about the different types of stitches and it looked like there are a lot of them. Steve is a every intelligent person it only took him a year to learn it, and it turned out great. The material he bought was different in so many ways some would stretch when it was sewn together so he had to be careful. When he would sew long distance, the lines would be off, then he would have to start over. He told us he did that few times. He has a good sense of humor at the time he was telling us, but we all know how that works at the time it's not fun. He talked about all the different types of foam to be used in the seats, we found out there is a lot of foam to be used. He told us he needed a new front seat frame. His was worn out so he made all new foam and padding for the front seat. It was done and in the car and it looks real good. So I figure he can be the club upholster, I said he has a good sense of humor, I hope he can take what I just said as a joke. The back seat was a great job as well.

The last step he had to show us was the right door panel, completely new, showed the material he was using. This time he was using two different types of material, the first was the hard board that the material would be glued to. Then we got so see Steve set behind a sewing machine and make those two fit like a glove, Then he showed the type of seam needed to sew the two together. He did a great job and it looked wonderful. Cover Photo It Found Me

One hot afternoon in August 2022 while Pat and I were enjoying an ice cream in downtown Golden I received a phone call from the younger sister of my high school car buddy and business partner. She had received a call from her best friend in high school looking for help. Her friend Betty was cleaning up her parent's property because she had sold it, after renting it for twelve years, and only had two weeks before closing. Betty's dilemma was when she opened the old dilapidated garage, she discovered a 1932 Ford with four flat tires and didn't know what to do. Kim knew I had old cars so she called me to see if I could help Betty. I told Kim to give me Betty's phone number and I would talk to her.

Betty's folk's property from the 1940's was where she grew up in the 60's and was three miles from my house. A time and date were set for me to meet Betty at the property and look at the car. Betty is a petite, small lady who has had Polio since she was three years old and used two arm stabilization crutches to walk. Days before our meeting, when she opened the garage to see what was inside, not only was a car in there, but she also discovered the garage had become a hoarder's paradise for storing discarded items. She was taken a back as she already had more than she could handle cleaning up the property. Her high school sweetheart husband had recently experienced a minor stroke and could not help with the cleanup. Her son runs his own business so he could not take time off during the week to assist. So, she was tackling this huge task by herself. Thus, the call to Kim seeking help with what to do about the car.

She had no idea the car was in there or when her Dad acquired it.

I told her that the car removal would not be a problem and that I could store it inside safe and sound until she could decide what to do with it. I told Betty I would clean out the garage while she tended to the other three outbuildings. A 40 cubic yard container was in the gravel driveway a few feet from the garage. The car turned out to be a 1933 Fordor Deluxe not a 1932.

Both being Golden natives, close to the same age and knowing many common friends we quickly became pals. The garage was a small 1940's garage with accordion doors, one of which literally fell off when she opened it. The '33 was just part of the hoarder's mess. Rubble was up to the top of the grill, on the front fenders, on the hood, on the top, on the running boards, inside and underneath. Two fifty Ford pickup front fenders were on the hood, (sadly I removed them before taking the photos). You could not walk to the front wall of the garage. Most of the refuse went into the dumpster. I set aside items that I thought Betty should make the decision on as to keep or throw away. When the day came to remove the car, she brought her husband with her to witness the removal because she thought it would be quite a chore. I took all four wheels and tires off and put on four I had in my inventory. I winched it on the trailer, tied it down and we were ready to take it to storage. The first 40 cubic yard dumpster had been removed the day before allowing access to the car. Being a native, she knew exactly where I lived. I told her to follow me home so she and her husband could see where and how it would be stored. She expressed that a huge load had been lifted off her.

With nothing but time on my hands I told her I would help her with the rest of the outbuilding and property clean up. Using my Dad's 1934 pickup I ended up hauling two overloaded loads of scrap steel away for her. For a change the steering on that ol' 34 Ford was very easy and due to the load the truck swayed back and forth on the way home. In the end we completely loaded two 40 cubic yard dumpsters and she was able to meet the deadline. Working with her and watching her though this whole ordeal I labeled her "Miss Inspiration" which humbled her.

After the break from the work, stress and closing, a week or so later Betty agreed to meet to discuss the fate of the '33. Somewhere along the line I had articulated an interest in purchasing the car.

We sat at the sprint car right rear wheel and tire glass top table in the museum and had the greatest time visiting. As I said above, we had become pals. When she and her husband were here to see where the car would be stored, they viewed the museum. When we finally got around to talking about the '33 she told me that she had discussed it with her husband, son, daughters, family, and they concluded it belonged here. (Continued on page 6)

Needless to say, I was overjoyed. I told her if the car could talk, I thought it would be very pleased to be at a home with several like siblings. She chuckled and agreed. Consequently, a deal was consummated.

Later, while working on the paperwork to process getting a title, I told her that I believed divine intervention is what landed this car in my possession where it would be appreciably cared for and loved. She agreed it was meant to be. On her part she believed divine intervention was what caused our meeting enabling me to help with the clean up because she was extremely worried and stressed not knowing how she was going to make the closing deadline, especially after discovering the crammed full contents and car with four flat tires in the garage. 
9:00 AM – Museum: Sit down Presentation: Battle of the Coral Sea, Mariana's Turkey Shoot featuring the Corsair


