

































ANCHORS AWEIGH

By golly, at our January 21st Installation Banquet, the Club presented me with something other than a characture of me and a vintage vehicle. That rascal, Mark Merritt, must have been listening to one of my rants about my days in the Navy. Low and behold, he found a photo of the U.S.S. Goldsborough DDG-20 which at the time was a brand new Guided Missile Destroyer. She was constructed at the Navy shipyard in Bremerton, Washington, which is close to Seattle. As part of the commissioning crew I became a Plank Owner, which is a throwback to the wooden ship era. The Goldsborough was a ship that utilized Guided Missiles as part of her armament, and was a surface-to-air device. The Goldsborough was invited to the Coral Sea celebration in Australia, along with two other U.S. Navy ships. The Coral Sea celebration honors the resistance in Australia and the United States preventing the Japanese from entering the Sydney, Australia harbor and laying waste to that country. We stayed a week in Sydney and a week in Melbourne, before returning to our home port in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, stopping in Pago Pago (prononced Pango) American Samoa en route. Our next assignment was "WesPac" or the Western Pacific Tour with visits to Midway Island, Yokosuka and Sasebo, Japan, Buckner Bay, Okinawa, Hong Kong, Vietnam, Subic Bay, Philippines and Koughsiung, Taiwan.



Three weeks before our WesPac deployment, I was promoted to QM3 (Quartermaster Third Class) and transferred to the U.S.S. Walker DD-517, a World War II destroyer. The Walker at the time was the second oldest destroyer in the Pacific Fleet, so the change was significant. The Walker was commissioned in 1943 and the Goldsborough in 1963. We got underway in November of 1964 for WesPac. The Walker and the Goldsborough were part of the same destroyer squadron "Desron 11" a.k.a. Destroyer Squadron Eleven. We as Desron 11 escorted the U.S.S. Yorktown CVS 10, an anti-submarine aircraft carrier on our WesPac journey. The Walker is a whole new chapter in my Navy experience; so I won't go any further, except to say after a couple of stops in Japan, and then Hong Kong, President Johnson escalated our involvement in Vietnam and that changed our mission from Peace Time to War Time.

I was proud to have served my Country on both the Goldsborough and the Walker, and equally proud to have served the Early Ford V-8 Club in various capacities over the past 46 years, most recently as President in 2023. Anchors Aweigh V8'ers!
